FLY TECH SPEAK: DENIECE DE PRIESTER

In February, our monthly Tech Talk speaker at the Barker Hangar in the Santa Monica Airport, was Captain Deniece De Priester, European Airline Transport Pilot. Capt De Priester is well-known for having executed a perfect water landing in the Hudson River after having engine failure in her Piper Cherokee while out flying as a Certified Flight Instructor with a student pilot she was giving a lesson to. Capt De Priester's story has been covered by countless

television and print publications. Deniece's experience as a pilot and with gliders and sea planes specifically, was "very useful" in preparing her to handle this emergency. It was her responses that saved her life and the life of her passenger. Her experience flying regional jets and as a flight attendant were also instrumental preparing her to respond to emergencies.

Capt De Priester shared her story with us and discussed how to handle emergency landings. Her charismatic and enthusiastic delivery had us all laughing while we learned and enjoyed her story. "When I was going down, I was thinking, 'If Sully can do it, probably I can do it, too,' " -Captain De Priester

RETRO FLY Inspiring Aviatrix honored in this issue

Captain Beverly Lynn Burns is the first woman to captain a Boeing 747. By the time Beverly retired in 2008, she had logged a total 25,000 hours of flight and had piloted the Boeing 747, Boeing 757, Boeing 767, Boeing 777 as well as an array of McDonnell-Douglas commercial aircraft.

The reason Burns became a commercial airline captain in the first place is that during her flight attendant days, a first officer explaining to the crew why there were no female pilots of commercial aircraft said: "Women are just not smart enough to do this job."
